Parent Engagement Sessions!!



Starting in April, we will be offering information sessions for parents. The topics were identified in a recent parent survey. We are working with a consortium of experts from Well Mind Counselling who will be facilitating these sessions/workshops on:

Risky Behaviours—April 18th (5 pm to 6 pm) Library at MBE

Part of being a child is pushing the boundaries and learning our place in the world, which includes some level of risky behaviors. But as a parent, how do we know when those risks are beyond the norm and something we need to address? In this presentation, we'll look at developmental stages and the risky behaviours that are common for each of these stages. We'll also discuss what we can and should do if the risks are outside of the norm.

Exploring family fun and outdoor activities—April 26th (5 pm to 6 pm) Outside Field Areas of MBE

The staff at Bench will offer a session for families and explore a variety of fun filled activities that your family can engage in together—taking time away from screens and some time connecting with your loved ones. This session will take place outside in the field areas of our school. You will leave this session with some fantastic ideas.

Supporting kiddos with mental health concerns-May 4th (5 pm to 6 pm) Location TBD

If your child struggles with ADHD, anxiety, OCD, depression or any other mental health disorder, this presentation will help you learn to support them. We'll discuss some of the foundations of mental health in kiddos and how that can be presented differently in children than it does in adults. We'll look at co-regulation techniques you can use with your child to help them better manage whatever they are going through. Lastly, we'll look at some of the things you can do support yourself, so that you are better equipped to be there for your child.

Loss, Change and Transition-May 17th (5pm to 6 pm) Location TBD

Whether someone passes away, a family structure changes or it's a big move, loss, change, and transition are events that all children experience at some point in their life.

In this presentation, we will go through the key factors that build resilience, seeing how we can apply each of these to your child's life to help them manage through the tough times. For each factor, we'll offer some clear techniques or tools you could try out and we'll also help you brainstorm what that could look like with your individual child.

Body Image—June 7th (5pm to 6pm) Location TBD

Recent statistics have found that anywhere between 52-79% of children as young as 6 years worry about how they look. 35% of these kids experience strong worry because of their appearance. This presentation will focus on supporting our kids in building strong relationships with their bodies. We'll also discuss some of the common signs that suggest you may want to get your child extra support, or signs that they have an unhealthy relationship with food.

Please note that this conversation will not just center on girls, and we also strongly welcome parents with boys to attend.

Identity-June 22nd (5pm to 6 pm) Location TBD

Many parents have worries and concerns about their child's exploration of their personal identity. We'll begin our conversation defining some terms to get on the same page, and then talk about best practices around personal identity. We'll discuss the concerns that you may have and discuss some age-appropriate ways to discuss and explore personal identity with your children.

The sessions will take place in person. Snacks, coffee, or tea will be provided for those who join us in person. Due to the nature of the sessions and the need to prepare food, we will be asking parents to confirm their interest in attending. A reminder will be sent out prior to the session.

Our first session on Risk Behavior will take place on April 18th and held at Merritt Bench Elementary.

The Coldwater Indian Band is still seeking 2 individuals to be Indigenous Monitors for the Trans Mountain West Alternative side. The individuals must have Class 5. The contract will be full-time from time of hire to the end of September 2023 and Part-time from October to December 2023. The shifts will be 3 days per week at 12 hours per day and you will not be required to use your own transportation. The individuals will have to take some courses that are required by Trans Mountain as well as First Aid. Please submit your letter of intent and resume to Laura Antoine – Band Administrator (Attention Human Resource Committee) and you will be called for an interview.

We are also seeking an individual for part-time contract work to coordinate our Emergency Committee meetings, update information and organize volunteers and training for the E.O.C. as well as any E.S.S. requirements. If you are interested, please submit your letter of intent and resume to Laura Antoine – Band Administrator (Attention Human Resource Committee) and an interview can be arranged. This will be contract work.



West Route Coldwater – Trans Mountain Committee Newsletter Update – April 2023

In April 2021, Coldwater Indian Band (CIB) and Trans Mountain (TM) established a committee to bring Coldwater concerns and priorities regarding the Trans Mountain Expansion Project (TMEP) forward to proactively discuss CIB concerns or interests and work towards mutually agreeable solutions, as well as share project information. To protect Coldwater's aquifer, the pipeline was routed to the west of IR1, known as the West Route. The TMEP is now under construction with work underway to install the pipeline.

We have heard from community members that there is a need for more transparency. Therefore, we asked Trans Mountain to provide a monthly update in the Coldwater newsletter regarding construction plans.

TMEP Construction Update – April 2023

Construction Activities

Construction progressed well in March and a good deal of the pipeline is installed on the West Route. Community members can expect to see some equipment being hauled out.

Construction and clean-up activities continue on the right-of way.

Crews have started to move some equipment in to the Coldwater north and south river crossings and are starting preparation and set-up activities for direct pipe installation under the river.

Roads

Paul's Basin Road has re-opened after successful completion of open cuts.

Environment

Environment crews continue to work with all the individual crews to monitor and keep all erosion controls measures in place.




Fact Sheet: Coldwater River North & South Crossings

As part of the Trans Mountain Expansion Project, a trenchless crossing method called Direct Pipe Installation (DPI), will be used to cross **under** the north and south sections of the Coldwater River. This method eliminates disturbance to the riverbed and does not affect the flow of water.

DPI is a pipeline method that combines horizontal directional drilling (HDD) and micro tunnelling techniques to allow pipeline installation in one step. Using DPI construction to install the pipeline under the Coldwater River avoids disturbance of the riverbed, water flow and fish and fish habitat.


DIRECT PIPE INSTALLATION (DPI)

DIRECT PIPE INSTALLATION (DPI)

From the entry pit, the pipe will be clamped and pushed by a pipe thruster under the river and out through the exit pit. DPI results in a reduced setup footprint and ground disturbance at entry and exit locations.

RISK MANAGEMENT

- Work will be monitored by Environmental Inspectors, an Indigenous Monitor, and a Coldwater Technical Monitor.
- The entry and exit points of the DPI are set back from the river to avoid impacts to fish and fish habitat.
- Minimizes the risk of frac outs by using reduced bentonite slurry (non-toxic) amounts.
- Uses a reduced setup footprint and ground disturbance at entry and exit locations.
- Turbidity monitoring at river location and frequent frac walks on the upland areas near the exit and entrance (every four hours) during drilling operations.
- All work is conducted under Trans Mountain's Environmental Protection and Pipeline Protection
 Programs to ensure compliance with applicable regulations and requirement

Once drilling of the crossing is started the work schedule is 24/7 to safely complete the crossing



Readiness Training Sessions for Upcoming Environmental and Archaeology Fieldwork: Enbridge Southern Expansion Program

Enbridge would like to invite interested individuals to an upcoming training session for environmental and archaeology field work opportunities occurring on the Sunrise Expansion Program ("the Project") this spring and summer.

Enbridge has hired Jacobs Environmental Consulting to lead the field work studies required to develop an Environmental and Socio-Economic Assessment (ESA) for the Project, which will support a regulatory application next year. To support the field work, we are looking for trained field crew participants for the roles of Environmental Team Members and Cultural Guardian, beginning in May 2023. Descriptions of these paid participation opportunities can be found attached to this email.

Jacobs has already begun reaching out to Indigenous Nations regarding sub-contracting details for these positions, as well as other business opportunities available on the Project related to the environmental field work program. Please note, this is not related to potential construction opportunities at this time. Construction of the Project is subject to regulatory approval.

The Readiness Training Sessions will cover all required safety training courses to join the Jacobs field crews as an Environmental Team Member and/or Cultural Guardian, including:

- Enbridge Orientation 2023
- Jacobs Orientation
- Enbridge Ground Disturbance
- Wildlife Safety and Bear Avoidance
- Bear Spray Training
- Pipeline Construction Safety Training (PCST)



Important information

- To ensure consistent safety practices on the Project, all individuals serving as Environmental Team Members and Cultural Guardians <u>must</u> participate in a Readiness Training Session, unless proof of current certification is provided.
- Individuals will be required to provide proof of a clean Alcohol and Drug test if they have been continuously employed in the last 90 days or pass a mandatory Alcohol and Drug Test, with negative results obtained no more than 30 days before the start of the fieldwork.
- Specific field work schedule dates, locations and confirmation of positions will be provided at a later date.
- Participants in the field work will be employed by their member Nation or affiliated company, which will hold a subcontract with Jacobs.

Honorarium and reimbursement of expenses

Coffee, snacks and lunch will be included each day of the training session. Enbridge will be providing honorariums and reimbursements of expenses to confirmed participants.

Environment Team Members will be employed by their member Nation or affiliated company who will be subcontracted to Jacobs.

Roles and responsibilities

An Environmental Team Member, as identified by Indigenous group or affiliated company, to join Jacobs or subcontractor field crews to observe, monitor, and as able, support field crews with study data collection. Environmental Team Members will have the ability to work in several disciplines including **Aquatics**, **Wetlands**, **Vegetation and Wildlife**.

Individuals with a strong understand of their traditional territory or a desire to learn more about the natural world they live in will find this role incredibly rewarding.

Work schedule

- 10 12 hours per day, 7 days a week
- Work rotation is decided by Indigenous group or affiliated company and may vary by scope of work
- Travel and accommodation will be provided. Special assistance may be arranged if advanced notice is provided.

Duties

- Contribute to the daily pre-task safety plans. Report safety opportunities, near misses and incidents to the crew lead
- Assist in the observation of natural elements found during fieldwork, and take part in the data collection required

Qualifications

- Individuals with a deep knowledge of the local Indigenous cultural values are encouraged to apply
- · Be physically fit, able to hike in steep and rough terrain all day
- 12 panel drug and alcohol pre-access test within 30 calendar days prior to access
- · Meet provincial health orders issued for COVID-19
- · Pipeline Construction Safety Training
- · Wildlife Safety and Bear Avoidance
- · Enbridge orientation
- Jacobs Health, Safety and Environment (HSE) Chartering/ orientation

Location:

Cultural Guardians provide the observation of a field study or alteration within a natural environment. This would occur in traditional land use areas including waterways and forests. The Cultural Guardian's role is to ensure that any fieldwork and discoveries are managed in a culturally appropriate way and that any alterations to the natural world are carried out in a way that respects Indigenous traditions and beliefs. Working alongside a crew of professional Archaeologists and qualified biophysical professionals, the Cultural Guardian is valued member of a field crew who can help enhance the protection of cultural and ecological values.

The Cultural Guardian could be an Indigenous Elder or other Traditional Knowledge holder who has been identified by the Indigenous group.

Work schedule

- 10 12 hours per day, 7 days a week
- Work rotation is decided by Indigenous group or affiliated company and may vary by scope of work
- Travel and accommodation will be provided. Special assistance may be arranged if advanced notice is provided

Duties

- Sharing with Archaeology/Environmental Team members any significant field discoveries and help to guide and educate surrounding Indigenous cultural beliefs and values
- Contribute to the daily pre-task safety plans. Report safety opportunities, near misses and incidents to the crew lead
- Assist in the observation of natural elements found during fieldwork
- This position does not include driving or specialized equipment use



Qualifications

Subcontractor:

- Individuals with a deep knowledge of the local Indigenous cultural values is encouraged
- · Be physically fit, able to hike in steep and rough terrain all day
- · Meet provincial health orders issued for COVID-19
- · Pipeline Construction Safety Training
- · Wildlife Safety and Bear Avoidance
- · Enbridge Orientation
- Jacobs Health, Safety and Environment (HSE) Chartering/ Orientation
- · Bear spray awareness training
- · Ground disturbance video (Archaeology only)
- 12 panel drug and alcohol pre-access test within 30 calendar days prior to access

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) requirements:

- · CSA-approved hard hat with side impact protection
- · Safety glasses with side shields
- · Safety-toed boots
- · High visibility vest
- · Standard CUT 5 gloves, long-sleeved shirt and pants

Cultural Guardians are required to bring their own PPE. Please let us know if you require assistance on obtaining the appropriate PPE.
